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Organizational Scope Effects the Improvements

- CMMI-based improvements may be confined to a single part of the organization
 - Business reasons, piloting
- Different levels of the organization may provide parts of the CMMI-required infrastructure





Organizational Scope

Effects the Applicability of Appraisal Results

- The Organizational Unit (OU) defines the scope of the appraisal
 - Chosen by the organization to support improvement goals
 - Different companies handle differently





For a Given OU

Sampling Effects Appraisal Accuracy

- All SCAMPI methods permit sampling of projects
- Lead Appraiser is responsible for ensuring sampled projects are "representative of the organization unit"
- No requirements on how much sampling can be done
 - 5 projects out of 100?
 - Best projects or average projects?
 - Big project versus little projects?
- No requirements for what types of projects can be omitted

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Buyer Beware

- When you hear ...
 - "We're Level X against the staged model"
 - "We're Capability Level Y against the continuous model"
- ... a buyer has to ask some questions:
 - What was the Organization Unit?
 - How much sampling was done?
 - What projects were left out?
 - Who was the Lead Appraiser?
 - How experienced was the appraisal team?
- Buyers should review the Appraisal Disclosure Statement (ADS) for these answers
 - The ADS describes the organizational scope
 - The ADS is required for all SCAMPI-A appraisals
 - Without an ADS, you can't assess accuracy or applicability
